ABEL TASMAN NATIONAL PARK

Embrace the spirit of nature and paddle a waka along the Abel Tasman coast. Combining idyllic surrounds, history and Māori tradition, glide across the waters to Split Apple Rock.



BAY OF ISLANDS

Known for its stunning beauty and history, the Bay of Islands is a subtropical micro-region encompassing 144 islands between Cape Brett and Purerua Peninsula.



COROMANDEL

Renowned for its pristine beaches, misty forests and laid-back vibe, it is one of New Zealand's most popular holiday destinations.

DUNEDIN

Surrounded by dramatic hills and a picturesque harbour. Dunedin has fascinating Scottish heritage and is home to Larnach Castle, New Zealand's only castle.



ECO HOLIDAYS

New Zealand is a country of amazing landscapes and wildlife. Enjoy the National Parks and the many protected areas, including Mount Cook National Park and Wai-O-Tapu Geothermal Reserve.



FIORDLAND NATIONAL PARK

Spanning mountain ranges, dense forests and alpine lakes; this remarkable natural environment features stunning fiords, spectacular waterfalls and snow-capped peaks.





GISBORNE

One of the most easterly locations in New Zealand, 90 kilometres north of Gisborne in the Tairāwhiti region, this mountain is one of the first places in the world to see the sunrise.



HOBBITON

Home of Middle Earth™, Matamata is a must-see if you're a Lord of the Rings and Hobbit fan. Two hours south of Auckland lies the lush farmland of the Hobbiton Movie Set.



ICE

Home to many stunning glaciers, most located on the South Island, the Fox and Franz Josef Glaciers are the largest and most visited. Seeing ancient rivers descending past emerald green rainforest is a sight you'll never forget.

JET BOATING

Speed through narrow canyons and mountainous views in a thrilling New Zealand jet boat ride. Sit back, buckle yourself in and feel the acceleration.



KIA ORA

New Zealand has three official languages: English, Te Reo Māori, and New Zealand Sign Language. English is the primary language; however, around 4% of people speak Te Reo. This makes it the second most commonly spoken language in New Zealand.



LAKE TEKAPO

Picturesque by day and dazzling by night, Lake Tekapo is part of the UNESCO Dark Sky Reserve, it makes for the perfect spot for stargazing.





MOUNT COOK

With sky-scraping peaks, glaciers and permanent snow fields, all set under a star-studded sky. Mount Cook is the tallest mountain in New Zealand.



NAPIER

Find yourself amongst beautifully restored Art Deco buildings. Located close by to Napier is also home to many fine wineries, known for Pinot Gris and Syrah varieties.



OTAGO

Located on the Southern part of the South Island, the Otago region includes many popular and well known places to visit such as Queenstown, Wanaka, Dunedin, Cromwell and The Catlins to name just a few.

PUNAKAIKI ROCKS

Gaze in wonder at the Punakaiki pancake rocks and blowholes, where columns of water shoot upwards from rocks that look like giant stacks of hotcakes.



QUEENSTOWN

Known as the hub of adventure, from skiing in the winter, to bungee jumping, sky diving and canyon swimming all year round. Also a renowned cycling destination, this is a popular holiday spot for the adventurous amongst us.



ROTORUA

Visit the stunning geothermal landscapes, sparkling lakes and beautiful forests that this region has to offer.





SPRINGS

The country is located on the Pacific Ring of Fire, meaning that there is a lot of tectonic activity throughout the country. Visit untouched hot springs such as: Waikite Valley Thermal Pools, Tekapo Pools and Hanmer Springs.



TAMAKI MĀORI VILLAGE

Found 15km south of Rotorua, this recreated traditional village is located under the shelter of an ancient 200 year old native Tawa forest.



ULVA ISLAND

Visit the iconic Ulva Island/Te Wharawhara, off Stewart Island, a beautiful unspoiled rainforest, allowing you to walk through bush vibrant with bird life, not found on the mainland.

VINEYARDS

New Zealand vineyards offer perfect terroir for producing world-class red and white wines. From silky pinot noir to crisp sauvignon blanc, the most famous wineries are Waiheke Island and Hawke's Bay in the North and Nelson and Marlborough in the South.



WAITANGI

As the founding document of New Zealand, the Treaty of Waitangi holds great importance in New Zealand's history. Visit the Waitangi Treaty Grounds, the country's most important historic site.



XPLORE

Across this incredible country, you can find everything from untamed wilderness to rich culture.





YELLOW-EYED PENGUIN

See the rare yellow-eyed penguin on the Otago Peninsula. Embark on a wildlife tour from Dunedin to give you an incredible close up of the hoiho penguins in their natural habitat.
